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A sense of community – the twenty-first century's most important skill

Climate change, pandemics and conspiracy theories are testing our society to the limit. If we hope to come out the other side, we will need not technology or competition but the twenty-first century's most important skill: a sense of community. This forgotten virtue is inherent in all of us, as demonstrated in psychological experiments and in tribal populations as well as in times of crisis and war, but it requires the right political framework to bolster it.

Bestselling author Ulrich Schnabel weaves together findings from anthropology, social psychology, economics and environmental science to show why being part of a community prolongs life, how we can successfully cooperate, and why individual freedom can only flourish in societies that find a common consensus.

Ulrich Schnabel (1962) studied physics and journalism and is currently science editor at the *Zeit*. In 2006, he was awarded the Georg von Holtzbrinck Prize for science journalism. His book *Measuring Faith* was Science Book of the Year 2009. In 2010 he received the Werner and Inge Grüter Prize for the Communication of Science. His books *Leisure* (2010) and *Confidence* (2018) were bestsellers and have consistently sold well since.

What present-day activists can learn from activism's hundred-year history

Knut Cordsen explores a defining phenomenon of the last hundred years, beginning with an activists' conference in 1919, which Robert Musil ultimately did not attend, and ending with the cancel culture debates of the present day. By placing activists' work on racism, gender and climate change in historical context, he helps us to understand the dogmas necessarily inherent in activism – and the ways in which society benefits from the triumphs of activist movements.

Cordsen brings some clarity to a hotly contested issue, outlining a typology of activists, separating the wheat from the chaff – and shedding light on the places where the 'error of activism', as Walter Benjamin dubbed it in 1932, is still being committed.

Knut Cordsen, born in Kiel in 1972, attended the German Journalism School in Munich and studied communication, political science and sociology at Ludwig Maximilian University. Since 1997 he has worked on the cultural desk at news outlet *BR* as well as for other regional broadcasters – as a literary critic and host of the shows *kulturWelt* and *Diwan: Das Büchermagazin* (Bayern2).

WHAT A STORY!

Gianni Jovanovic is in his mid-40s, has two grandchildren – and is gay. He is also an entrepreneur, an activist and one of the most well-known voices of Sinti and Roma in Germany. Born in Germany in 1978, he and his family repeatedly experienced racist hostilities. His parents married him off when he was 14 years old. At 17 years old, he was already a father of two, and in his early 20s, Gianni came out. He has now been with his husband for 18 years.

In this book, together with journalist Oyindamole Alashe, Jovanovic tells his story of self-empowerment, while painting the picture of an anti-racist, diverse society. Gianni's secret weapons are charm and humour – especially when it hurts. His life and his political activism feel like one big exclamation mark: Diversity! Tolerance! Togetherness! Charity! And a great deal of bravery!

Gianni Jovanovic is an entrepreneur, activist and performer. He is considered one of the most prominent voices of Sinti and Roma in Germany, and is committed to the rights of black people and people of colour within the LGBTQI+ community.

Oyindamola Alashe was born in the U.S. in 1978 to a Nigerian father and a German mother. She is a journalist and a single mother. She also organises anti-racist projects and supports activists in the LGBTQI+ community. She is close friends with Gianni Jovanovic.

Will the city miss its residents when they are gone one day?

Gregor Hens traverses the metropolises of the world as a reader, as a walker and even as a swimmer, from Berlin via Las Vegas to Shenzhen, from the outermost fringes of society to the dull spaces of city centres marketed for tourism. Gregor Hens is at home in urban spaces, like in his native city of Cologne or in Berlin, where the city map corresponds to his own life circumstances and he moves around through »cityscapes« day and night. He writes about familiar, far-away metropolises that he has explored as a traveller, metropolises for which we only have a defined image in our minds, or which we hold onto in our collective memory, and megacities somewhere in the world that he only mentions by name.

Gregor Hens explores the urban world of our planet in the tradition of psychogeography, reads Virginia Woolf, Guy Debord and Rem Koolhaas, digs into the deepest layers of a city and ascends with the camera eye until it is at his feet in all its complexity and beauty: as a picture, as a map, played on by marvelling children and sometimes stopped in its tracks by catastrophe. Cities and their alternative concepts are complex structures consisting of innumerable aesthetic elements. They are dealt with in Gregor Hens' prose, which reads like a detailed street map that offers the most surprising links and references.

Gregor Hens, born in Cologne in 1965, has taught at various American universities, most recently at Ohio State University. He has been living in Berlin as a freelance writer and translator since 2013. He has translated numerous novels, including ones by Leonard Cohen and Will Self.

From the wild early days of the Frankfurt School to new ways of thinking

In the summer of 1930, the smart Café Laumer in the Westend area of Frankfurt became the meeting point for an illustrious group: this was where devotees of the Institute for Social Research met with the circle around Karl Mannheim and Norbert Elias. They often held profoundly conflicting beliefs, but they did agree on one thing: sociology was the new supreme discipline. At long last, it was time to examine the 'real world' and free themselves from highfalutin metaphysical thinking. It's striking how many of the issues still resonate today: populism, racism, anti-Semitism, anti-democratic sentiment and the emergence of violence and hatred.

Wolfgang Martynkewicz traces the lives of the prominent figures in the debates, including Hannah Arendt, Adorno and Gisèle Freund, from early life to exile to the young federal republic, painting a clear picture of how a revolution in lifestyle went hand in hand with a revolution in thinking.

Wolfgang Martynkewicz, born in 1955, is a freelance author and lecturer in literature; he has numerous publications on literature of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries and on the history of psychoanalysis, including the successful paper *Salon Deutschland: Mind and Power 1900–1945*. In 2019 he published *1920: The zero Hour of the Mind*.

The Auerbach Case – one of the most dramatic legal battles of the 1950s

In April 1952 a trial began in Munich, one so sensational that even the *New York Times* sent a correspondent. The defendant was the most prominent Jewish man in post-war Germany: Philipp Auerbach. A survivor of Auschwitz, he had devoted his life to helping other Holocaust survivors. His judges, former Nazis, convicted him of several minor offences. That same day, Auerbach took his own life. His tragic fate revealed that anti-Semitism didn't just disappear when the war came to an end.

Hans-Hermann Klare has written the first meticulously researched biography of Philipp Auerbach. This brilliant book casts the post-war era in a new light, depicting a world in which hundreds of thousands of displaced persons in Germany had to fight for the right to live in dignity – a world in which anti-Semitism never went away.

Hans-Hermann Klare, born in 1956, was for many years an author and senior editor at the magazine *Stern*. His feature on the American war photographer James Nachtwey was the basis for the Oscar-nominated documentary *War Photographer*. He has been involved with the UN Refugee Agency in Germany for many years, and since 2016 he has chaired the foundation's board of trustees.

The Fall of the Ottoman Metropolis in 1922 and its Consequences for Europe

100 years ago, Smyrna, the »Pearl of the Aegean«, went up in flames. Thousands upon thousands of refugees waited in vain for rescue in the port of what is today Izmir. The devastating fire was followed by a population exchange that served as a blueprint for the ethnic cleansing of the 20th century: almost two million Greeks and Turks were forced to leave their homeland. Today, refugees fear for their lives in the region once again, languishing in camps such as Moria.

Lutz Kleveman travels to Izmir, to the offshore islands of Chios and Lesbos – and through time. During his research, he uncovers the secret of the harmony that once ruled between Greeks, Turks, Armenians, Jews and Levantines in Smyrna. 20th century history packed into the life of a pragmatic intellectual

Hermann Budzislawski survived more regime changes and was effective in more diverse ways than any other left-wing intellectual: be it as the successor to Carl von Ossietzky and Kurt Tucholsky as head of the »Weltbühne« newspaper after 1933, as an employee of Dorothy Thompson in the U.S. or as a defining figure of socialist journalism in the GDR. Poland's contradictory national hero

Józef Piłsudski, 1867-1935, is considered the founder of modern Poland, which came into being in 1918 after more than 120 years of division. At the same time, he was one of the most important European statesmen of his era – and a person full of contradictions. Before World War I, Piłsudski became the leader of the Polish Socialists. Later he ruled autocratically in the new state. However, he distanced himself from the fascist and totalitarian regimes in other countries. He saw Poland as a home for many nations and cultures. Today it is primarily the National Catholics who want to claim him as their own. At the time, the Polish right accused him of his religious indifference and his closeness to the socialists, as well as his origins in what is today Lithuania.

Wolfgang Templin brings Piłsudski's adventurous biography to life. At the same time, it tells the tragic story of a country between great powers.

Wolfgang Templin, born in 1948, works as a publicist and teaches politics to adults. From 2010 to 2014, he headed the Warsaw office of the Heinrich Böll Foundation. He has received several awards in both countries for his services to German-Polish understanding. He has published books on the history and political developments in Ukraine and Poland.

How German Archaeologists Plundered the Middle Eastern World

The Pergamon Altar, the Market Gate of Miletus, the Ishtar Gate, the Bust of Nefertiti – these are all treasures that we admire in German museums today. Where do these works come from? When and under what circumstances did they come to Germany? Are we actually the rightful owners of these world-famous cultural assets? Jürgen Gottschlich and Dilek Zaptcioglu-Gottschlich thoroughly examine the history of archaeological excavations and their transport to the German Empire. The focus is on the expeditions of famous excavators and the predominantly nationalist motifs of their forays at the service of the emperor.

Up until now, the debate on looted art has been more concerned with works of art from African and Asian colonies – this is the first time that a book on archaeological finds in the former Ottoman Empire is being presented. Just as important as the demand for restitution is the following question: How do we make world heritage accessible to as many people as possible?

Jürgen Gottschlich, born in 1954, studied philosophy and journalism and has been a taz correspondent in Istanbul for 20 years. Among other works, Ch. Links Verlag has published *Turkey. Erdogan's Reach for Autocracy* (2016) and *Aiding and Abetting Genocide. Germany's Role in the Extermination of the Armenians* (2015).

Dilek Zaptcioglu-Gottschlich, born in 1959, studied history and politics. She is the author of numerous books and works as a journalist. Her work focuses on late 19th century history and the late history of the Ottoman Empire among other things. She lives in Istanbul and Berlin.

How Putin's war is changing the world

War in Europe. With ruthless violence, Vladimir Putin's Russia is in the process of invading Ukraine, bringing down every buttress that has ensured peace in Europe since the Second World War. Confrontation, not cooperation, seems to be Putin's new tactic. This is a turning point.

Rüdiger von Fritsch has met Vladimir Putin many times. He explains what motivates him, describing how he has increasingly become a prisoner of his obsessions and distorted perception of reality. The other feminism: a cultural revolution on the right

They condemn the #metoo movement as a bigoted product manufactured by Hollywood, refer to abortion as murder and defend traditional roles, arguing that they offer genuine freedom: conservative women have become a powerful voice in the USA. A unique glimpse behind the scenes of power

In public, Olaf Scholz is careful to portray himself as a level-headed man of action. But what's the reality behind the curtain? His tenure as mayor of Hamburg, when he was involved in giving a 47 million euro tax break to a private bank, offers clues. He lost more control of his image then than ever before, and no scandal has ever been so dangerous for him – or so revealing.

Based on witness testimony and new documents, this book uncovers Scholz's role in the incident. How did Germany's current chancellor and his aides behave under pressure? The first comprehensive history of the legendary anti-terrorism unit

On 18 October 1977, a German myth was born in the deserts of Somalia: at Mogadishu Airport, GSG 9 freed eighty-six people from a hijacked Lufthansa plane. It was the anti-terrorism unit's first major operation, and it made them world-famous overnight. The myth was shattered sixteen years later at the train station in Bad Kleinen, when the arrest of members of the Red Army Faction ended with two people dead and triggered a national crisis.

Fifty years after it was founded, Martin Herzog traces the story of GSG 9 from its inception, exploring its successes and failures as well as the questionable ways it has been made to serve foreign policy and the intelligence services. Drawing on archival research and interviews with contemporary witnesses, this is the first comprehensive, well-grounded history of a police unit shrouded in myth.

Martin Herzog, born in 1972, studied philosophy, politics and history in Cologne. He has worked as a journalist and filmmaker for thirty years, including for *Belgischer Rundfunk*, *Deutsche Welle* and various other broadcasters, focusing on history. Since 2003 he has contributed as a writer to the history radio programme *ZeitZeichen* on WDR. Over the years he has repeatedly returned to the story of GSG 9.
