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About loss and being lost, about the search for one's own sense of order

The boy smiles when he is afraid. He falls in love because he is sad. He is often silent, and then erupts with too much talking. He holds himself tightly together, even as an adolescent and adult.

When his father dies in an accident, the narrator's idyllic Waldorf childhood comes to an abrupt end. Now disorder reigns, also in himself, in his mind and body. He hides his grief and fear, but it will never disappear. His mother retreats, into herself and into the last corners of the increasingly chaotic house. He constantly stays with friends and develops a gifted sense of what he must do in order to be liked. And that's what he wants. He wants to be loved and admired; he wants to be a writer and belong to the high-flying cultural society of Berlin, where he moves after school. But disorder always remains in the background, growing and taking possession of him. Like a hidden current, the feelings of fear lurk within him, paralyzing him more and more until he can hardly move.

With poetic language, Simon Elson tells a true-to-life story in his debut novel of how the early death of his father drives him into a state of emotional disorder and crisis—in which thinking and feeling become indistinguishable, and he is no longer able to recognize what is good for him.

Simon Elson, born in 1980 in Hamburg, writes now and again for *Weltkunst* and *Monopol* in Berlin, but mainly books about art and artists. *History of Disorder* is his first novel.




You can't escape home

Kathleen has made it. She is successful, eloquent, and attractive. For years, she has been living in London as a graphic designer. She has left behind the place from which she comes. At least, that's what she thinks. But visits to her mother in Kosakenberg in Brandenburg, a small town near the Polish border, confront her with a world that she had tried to escape, and which now unleashes an unexpected force. Kathleen had left Kosakenburg when she was eighteen. It was the 1990s and, like millions of others, she headed west, full of hope for a better life beyond the East German provinces. After many years of absence, she asks herself: What would have happened if I had stayed? What kind of life would I have led?

With powerful visuals, Sabine Rennefanz takes us to a village in the east of the country, where almost only men have stayed and the few women who have not fled barter in eggs, dream of love, and talk about those who have left. Full of irony and melancholy, Sabine Rennefanz tells the story of what home is and how one leaves the provinces behind.

Sabine Rennefanz, born in 1974 in Beeskow, shot to fame as an author with her bestseller *Eisenkinder: The Silent Rage of the Reunification Generation*. She is one of Germany's leading columnists, was editor of the *Berliner Zeitung* for many years, and works as a journalist for *Der Spiegel*, *Der Tagesspiegel*, and *Radio 1*, among others. She has been awarded the Theodor Wolff Prize and the German Reporter Prize for her reports and essays. She lives with her family in Berlin.

An elegant house in the south of France, two women who love each other, and a celebration without a blessing: on the estate of an industrialist family, preparations are being made for the wedding of their daughter Rebecca. Full of melancholy, Swann travels to the wedding of her closest friend. There, south of Montpellier, in the barren landscape of the Garrigue, Rebecca's family has a house with a beautiful garden where the friends used to spend endless summers together. Now neither of them is young anymore, and Swann had not expected Rebecca to still marry. The whole family gathers in the ancient house, aside from Sami, the Moroccan gardener. He, too, no longer expected Rebecca to get married; he, too, had longed for her during the long winter months he spent alone in the large, dormant garden. Now he is in Paris while the wedding preparations are underway in the south of France and tensions arise in the family. Then comes the news that Notre Dame is on fire ...

In his new novel, Jakob Augstein writes of love in times of boredom, the rage of the invisible, and the beauty of nature as a final resort. The characters are scintillating and multifaceted, much like their feelings for one another. A sweeping portrait of a family and society set against the backdrop of the bright landscape of southern Provence.

Jakob Augstein, born in 1967, is an author, publisher, and publicist. In 2022 he released his debut novel *The Current*.

Here the Arctic, there a little village

A village fears its disappearance. That is why it is taking measures: the hedge, which is popular with tourists, is cherished and cared for, and the village treasury is checked regularly. But most importantly, the village takes care of Pina and Lobo, because these children are its future. But Pina and Lobo stopped growing a long time ago. While the village waits for the children to experience growth spurts, Pina's mother is in the Arctic watching the ice melt and the borders shift. Because there is no growth without disappearance.

Following her acclaimed debut, Swiss author Gianna Molinari once again presents a sensitive portrait of the mutual permeation of nature and culture. *The World Behind the Hedge* is simultaneously poetic and political, inviting us to think in a whole new way about growth, stagnation, disappearance and nature.

Gianna Molinari was born in Basel in 1988 and lives in Zurich. She studied literary writing at the Swiss Literature Institute and modern German literature at the University of Lausanne. She co-founded the art action group "Literatur für das, was passiert" (Literature for World Events) and the author collective "RAUF". Her debut novel *Everything Is Still Possible Here* was nominated for the German and Swiss Book Prizes.

The sea is constant. The war seems far away. The light lies in the shadows.

Lisbeth and the warrior have known each other since their training in the Armed Forces. They chose the military because they wanted a body that isn't weak — as if the only way to face the world is with a heart clenched in a fist. Many years have passed since they last saw each other, but they are still drawn to one another. They are women who have experienced violence and commit violence against themselves and those close to them. But Lisbeth and the warrior are also ready to fight against it.

The Warrior is a novel about the special friendship between two women whose top priority is to strip themselves of all vulnerability. Helene Bukowski tells of the resulting wounds, the violence, their traces and the trauma – both experienced and inherited.

Helene Bukowski, born in Berlin in 1993, once more lives in her city of birth. She studied at the Hildesheim Literature Institute and, in addition to writing, also runs creative writing courses and workshops. Her debut novel *Milk Teeth*, for which she was nominated for various awards, was published in 2019. The novel has been translated into French and English and a film adaptation is in the works.





A Jewish American woman dreams of socialism – The rediscovery of an indomitable female author

While their husbands, brothers, and sons are fighting in World War II, the women at the Port Empire Station in New Jersey, USA, are the ones who keep the railroad running – and often in addition to their previous duties. From their remaining male colleagues, "these broads" are greeted with jeers, ridicule and harassment. The men also try to pit the female conductors against each other – even though they are already struggling with the arduous balancing act between private and professional challenges. At the center of the action are two friends: the plucky, hands-on Jessie and the charming Toby. When the conflict eventually escalates, Jessie and Toby are forced to make a decision, as well as their male colleagues and the railroad company as a whole ... An astonishing story about the women who took over men's jobs during the Second World War, kept their communities running smoothly, and had to fight massive opposition and discrimination along the way.

Edith Anderson (1915 – 1999) was born into an American-Jewish family in New York. At the age of 20, she graduated from New College of Columbia University as an English teacher. When the United States entered World War II, she worked as one of the first female conductors for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. In 1943, Anderson met Max Schröder, a German exile. When Schröder went to East Berlin after the end of the War to work as an editor at Aufbau Verlag, Anderson followed her future husband. In Europe, too, she remained a stubborn and independent thinker who made a name for herself as a journalist, author, and editor. *A Man's Job* (1956) is her debut novel.

A gripping, feminist novel based on true events



Moving, shocking, courageous stories about women's life journeys

A schoolgirl searches for a way to end an unplanned pregnancy — like the young Brigitte Reimann once did herself — and is forced to realize that she is completely on her own in this "maturity test." Katja has to decide whether to marry the man that she loves, even though he demands that she subordinate herself to his career and give up her dream job. One evening before Christmas, the residents of an apartment building experience just how difficult it is to reconcile self-determination and care work. With her cycle of stories, the author wanted to explore the position of women in society in a literary way — so deeply did she feel the impact of the restrictions she constantly had to fight against, and the prejudice she was constantly exposed to because of her self-assured life choices.

Brigitte Reimann, born in Burg bei Magdeburg in 1933, was a freelance author since her first book was published in 1955. Her novel *Siblings* (1963), about newly-divided Germany, was one of the most discussed books of the time. The author died of cancer in Berlin at the young age of 39. Her posthumously published diaries *I Have No Regrets* and *All Tastes of Farewell* (new edition published in 2023) caused quite a stir thanks to their unflinching, unrelenting gaze, also turned towards the author herself. Her last work, *Franziska Lefthand*, (unabridged new edition published in 1998) is considered one of the most important novels in German post-war literature.

Carsten Gansel, the editor, was born in Güstrow/Mecklenburg in 1955 and has been professor of modern German literature at the University of Giessen since 1995. His biography of Brigitte Reimann, *I Am So Hungry for Life* (2023), was on the *Spiegel* bestseller list for weeks.

Paris, 1937. Hundreds of thousands of people follow the coffin of a young woman: Anna Seghers, Egon Erwin Kisch, Pablo Neruda and many others have come to protest against fascism, which cost Gerda Taro her life during the Spanish Civil War.

A few years earlier, the charismatic Gerda wishes to become a photographer. She is young, self-confident, full of enthusiasm and has a clear goal in life: she wants to use her images to say something about the world. But it is 1935, and nobody trusts a woman to handle a camera, let alone take photos that shed light on the political situation in Europe. Except for the photographer and Jewish emigrant Robert Capa, who recognizes Gerda's special talent and falls head over heels in love with her. The two become passionate lovers who inspire each other in their work. But when they go to Spain to report on the war against fascism, the moment comes when Gerda decides in favor of a motif and against private happiness.

With empathy and great sensitivity, bestselling author Caroline Bernard tells the story of a great love and a fascinating chapter in photo reportage.

Caroline Bernard is the pseudonym of Tania Schlie, a literary scholar who has worked as a freelance author and editor for twenty years. She has previously published eleven novels and about as many non-fiction books on cultural-historical topics. She loves coming up with stories about strong women. Her most successful book *Frida Kahlo and the Colours of Life* topped the bestsellers list for months and was translated into 21 languages.

A tale of a family split between Sicily and Berlin and a bittersweet love letter to southern Italy

Tita, a graphic designer in Berlin, receives a call from Sicily that takes her back to the past: her father Gianni left the southeastern part of the island in the early 1960s to find his fortune as one of the first guest workers in Berlin. He fell in love, started a family, and became successful through his establishment of frozen pizza in Germany. His early death clouded Tita's childhood, causing Sicily to fade from her memory. Now, 26 years later, Tita's uncle has also passed away, leaving her an emotional inheritance – the Magní estate, once the center of the extended family's life, which evokes memories of sun-drenched childhood summers. She returns to Sicily to save the house and finds not only the long-forgotten echoes of her childhood, but also new friends and a love for a magical place that could be home.

In this equal parts cheerful and melancholy novel, Patrizia Di Stefano tells a story of life abroad, homesickness, and the beauty of Sicily.

Patrizia Di Stefano, born in 1966 in Berlin, has turned her love of books into a profession as a graphic designer. Her book covers have won several awards. 


The stirring story of a women's dance group in the Golden Twenties in Berlin – breathless, dreamlike and romantic

The trademarks of the Lindy Girls are precision, expressiveness and a modern sense of female self-assurance. Secretary Gila has had enough of this and wants to write something completely different from what her boss dictates to her. But then something gets in their way that they did not anticipate – love...

Anne Stern, born in 1982, is a historian and writer and has a PhD in German studies. She lives with her family in Berlin. Her novels about the Berlin midwife *Fräulein Gold* became Spiegel bestsellers. In her novel *Three Days in August*, published by Aufbau Taschenbuch in 2022, she tells the eventful story of a Berlin chocolate shop on three days in 1936. Ever since Anne Stern went to a swing party in the legendary Spiegelsaal of the 1920s venue "Clärchens Ballhaus", she has wanted to write a novel about the Charleston of the Roaring Twenties. This inspired her to write the story about the Lindy Girls, a women's dance group in Berlin in 1928.





1968 – A young woman breaks through the wall of silence

Frankfurt, 1967: After Edda witnesses firsthand how the student Benno Ohnesorg is shot dead by a policeman at a demonstration, she has had enough of the excuses of her parents' generation, which condemns the youth but lets former Nazis get away scot-free. To escape the confines of her authoritarian family home, the 19-year-old goes to Paris for a year as an au pair directly after leaving school. Amid student revolts and protest marches against the Vietnam War, she falls in love with law student Marcel. However, the young Frenchman, whose parents were members of the Resistance, has reservations about the Germans — and awakens new questions in Edda: which side did her parents take during the years of National Socialism? Back in Frankfurt am Main, she confronts her father, but he remains silent. Only when Edda discovers old military correspondence in her mother's bedroom does she uncover the events of the past. What she discovers not only puts her relationship with Marcel to the test, but also makes her realize she has to decide how far she wants to go for justice ...

For 31-year-old Ava, a lifelong dream is coming true: she is to research the endangered mountain gorillas in the Congo. But life in the mountains is hard, and, as a woman, she encounters hostility. Only contact with the apes, who quickly come to trust her, provides her comfort. When poachers become aware of her camp, Ava's life is suddenly in danger. Only with the help of animal photographer Jack does she manage to escape. And the two become closer than they should be, because Jack is married ...

Based on the life of Dian Fossey, the author tells the story of an unconventional woman who flees her conservative life, shaped by the social constraints of the American upper class, and dedicates herself to a mission: to save the endangered mountain gorillas in the Rwandan jungle.

Claudia Seidel changed directions after initially training in banking, and studied sociology and comparative literature in Hamburg and Berlin. After many years in management positions in the publishing industry, she is now a freelance author and author coach.
